Useful Gloves

ATERIALS.—3 oz. 4-ply wool.
I pair No. II knitting needles.

TENSION.—Work to produce $7\frac{1}{2}$ sts. and 91 rows to one square inch in smooth fabric (I row K., I row P.).

ABBREVIATIONS: K.-knit. P.purl. St.-stitch. Tog.-together.

THE RIGHT HAND.—Cast on 54 sts.

Ist Row.—Working into the back of the sts., * k. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end.

2nd Row.—* K. I, p. I. Repeat from to the end. Repeat the 2nd row until 31 in. of ribbing have been worked. Proceed in pattern as follows :-

Ist Row.-* K. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end.

2nd Row.—Purl.
Shape the Thumb as follows:—

1st Row.—(K. I, p. I) 14 times, increase by knitting into the front and back of the next st., p. I, k. I, increase in the next st., * k. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end.

2nd and every alternate Row.-Purl. 3rd Row.—(K. I, p. I) 14 times, k. 2 (p. I, k. I) twice. * K. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end.

5th Row.—(K. I, p. I) 14 times, increase in the next st., (k. I, p. I) twice, increase in the next st., * k. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end.

7th Row.-* K. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end.

9th Row.—(K. I, p. I) 14 times, increase in the next st., (p. 1, k. 1) 3 times, increase in the next st., * k. 1, p. 1. Repeat from * to the end.

11th Row.—(K. I, p. I) 14 times, k 2, (p. I, k. I) 4 times, * k. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end.

13th Row .- (K. I, p. I) 14 times, increase in the next st., (k. 1, p. 1) 4 times, increase in the next st., * k. 1, p. 1. Repeat from * to the end.

15th Row .- * K. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end.

17th Row.—(K. I, p. I) 14 times, increase in the next st., (p. 1, k. 1) 5 times, increase in the next st., * k. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end.

19th Row.—(K. I, p. I) 14 times, k. 2, (p. I, k. I) 6 times, * k. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end.

21st Row.—(K. I, p. I) 14 times, increase in the next st., (k. 1, p. 1) 6 times, increase in the next st., * k. 1, p. 1. Repeat from * to the end

23rd Row .- * K. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end.

25th Row.—(K. I, p. I) 14 times, increase in the next st., (p. I, k. I) 7 times, increase in the next st., * k. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end.

27th Row.—(K. I, p. I) 14 times, k. 2, (p. 1, k. 1) 8 times, *k. 1, p. 1. Repeat from * to the end.

KNITTED ON TWO NEEDLES 29th Row.—(K. I, p. I)

14 times, k. 2 (p. 1, k, 1) 8 times, turn.

30th Row. - P. 18 sts., turn and cast on 4 sts.

31st Row. - Working into the back of the cast-on sts., (p. 1, k. 1) II times, turn. Continue working backwards and forwards on these 22 thumb sts. for 22 more rows, or the length required, finishing at the end of a "K. I, p. I row.

Next Row.—(P. 2 tog., p. 2) 5 times, p. 2 tog.

Next Row.-Knit.

Next Row.—(P. 2 tog., p. 2) 4 times.

Break off the wool and thread the end through the remaining sts. Draw up and fasten off securely, then stitch the sides of the thumb together, finishing at the base. With the right side of the work facing, join the wool to the base of the thumb and knit up 6 sts. through the cast-on sts. of the thumb (do not pick up the sts. but actually knit them up by putting the needle through the first knitted row of the 4 cast-on sts.; this makes a neater and stronger join), * k. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end of the row. (56 sts. now on the needle.) Keeping the continuity of the pattern, work 23 more rows, thus finishing at the end of a p. row.

Commence the Fingers as follows :-

1st Finger.

Next Row.—(K. I, p. I) 18 times, turn. Next Row .- P. 16 sts., turn and cast on

Proceed on these 18 sts., working into the back of the cast-on sts. on the first row only, and k ing the continuity of the pattern for 31 more rows, or the length required, finishing at the end of a "k. l, p. l " row.

Next Row.—(P. 2 tog., p. 2) 4 times,

p. 2 tog. Next Row.—Knit.

Next Row.—(P. 2 tog., p.2) 3 times, p. 1. Complete as for the thumb.


2nd Finger.

With the right side of the work facing, join the wool to the base of the 1st finger and knit up 2 sts. through the cast-on sts. of the 1st finger, k. 1, (p. 1, k. 1) 3 times from the left-hand needle, turn.

Next Row.—P. 16, turn and cast on 2 sts. Keeping the continuity of the pattern, and working into the back of the cast-on sts. on the first row only, work 33 rows or the length required, finishing at the end of a "k. I, p. I" row. Complete as for the 1st finger.

3rd Finger.

Work as the instructions for the 2nd finger,



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commencing with p. I, after knitting up 2 sts. at the base of the 2nd finger, but working 29 rows instead of 33 rows before completing the top.

4th Finger.

With the right side of the work facing, join the wool to the base of the 3rd finger and knit up 4 sts. through the cast-on sts. of the 3rd finger, (k. 1, p. 1) 3 times from the left-hand needle, turn.

Next Row.-P. 16, turn.

Keeping the continuity of the pattern, work 25 rows, or the length required, finishing at the end of a "k. I, p. I" row.

Next Row,—(P. 2 tog., p. 2) 4 times.

Next Row.—Knit.

Next Row.—(P. 2 tog., p. 2) 3 times. Complete as for the 1st finger, stitching down to the end of the side of the Glove.

THE LEFT HAND

Work exactly as the instructions for the Right Hand up to the commencement of the thumb.

Shape the Thumb as the instructions for the Right Hand, but working the bracketed portion at the commencement II times, instead of 14 times, the 1st row thus reading "(K. I, p. I) II times, increase in the next st., p. I, k. I, increase in the next st., * k. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end." Continue in this manner up to the completion of the 27th row.

Next Row.—Purl.

Next Row .- (K. I, p. I) II times, k. 2, (p. I, k. I) 8 times, turn and cast on 4 sts.

Next Row .- Working into the back of the cast-on sts., p. 22 turn. Continue as the instructions for the thumb of the Right Hand, but working 21 rows before shaping the top. With the right side of the work facing, join the wool to the base of the thumb and knit up 6 sts. through the cast-on sts. of the thumb, * k. I, p. I. Repeat from * to the end of the row. (56 sts. now on the needle.) Keeping the continuity of the pattern, work 23 more rows, thus finishing at the end of a p. row.

Commence the Fingers as follows :-

Ist Finger.

Next Row.—(K. I, p. I) 18 times, turn and cast on 2 sts.

REFUND OF UNUSED COUPONS

IN cases of special necessity, next of kin who require more than 20 coupons for their current parcel may, if they did not use their full allowance for their previous parcel, apply to the Red Cross for a refund of any balance of unused coupons which they returned with it.

In view of the great amount of clerical work and correspondence already entailed in connection with the control of coupons issued for prisoners of war, next of kin are particularly asked not to apply unless it is absolutely necessary.

Pead These Rules

The following rules must be observed:

- (1) All applications to be sent by (1) All applications to be sent by registered letter post and addressed to the Next of Kin Parcels Centre, 14, Finsbury Circus, London, E.C.2, or, if the coupons are issued by the Scottish Packing Centre, to the Prisoners of War Next of Kin Parcels Depot, 421, Sauchiehall Street, Glasgow, C.2. Envelopes should be clearly marked "REFUND."
- (2) The Prisoners of War coupon book must be forwarded with the application. If clothing has already been purchased it should be entered on the coupon account page, to account for the coupons used
- (3) Applications must not be made for a refund of unused coupons from any parcel except for the last one sent.
- (4) Refunded coupons must be used with the coupon book with which the application was made and may not be kept for a later parcel. Clothing purchased with refunded coupons must be entered on the coupon account in the ordinary way.
- (5) The prisoner's full name, regiment and Red Cross file number must be given in every letter of application which should on no account refer to any other matter. No reply will be sent to any other question included in these letters. these letters.

Tins for Food

Do you use special tin for your food parcel contents?

Yes, special lacquering is used for tins sent in Prisoners of War food parcels, the lacquering differing according to the commodity. Many of the foods sent are commodity. Many of the foods sent are also canned in special sizes suitable for inclusion in these parcels.

Study Facilities

Can you tell me how the provision of In you tell me now the provision of study facilities for prisoners is governed. In view at the fact that work is compulsory, for those under the rank of sergeant, and that working hours are often very long and days off very infrequent (in my husband's case there is only one day off in any hard described. only one day off in 21), how do some of the "other ranks" manage to study for

work is compulsory for Privates although not for N.C.O.s or protected personnel, but it is not necessarily continuous, and if a man is determined to study he usually does so, even though it be at the end of his day's work. One man worked for his B.Sc. after ro hours a day in a salt mine, and a number of Privates have already passed examinations. In Stalag 344 (formerly Stalag VIIIB) the Germans have allowed men preparing for examination to return to the base about six weeks before the examination is held.

Transit Camp

What is a Transit Camp? I am anxious for news of my son who was a prisoner of war in Stalag and have been told he may be in a Transit Camp and
